## HIGHLIGHTS 2022

#### Some of our memorable moments include:

- De Rust Futura Academy performs at Rhoda Kadalie memorial service in Rondebosch. Many well-known public figures and politicians were present. The choir sang a special son "Blue Sky" from Ghoema by Taliep Pietersen ons of Rhoda's favourite songs and the marimba band performed a truly African piece.
- Marimba band played at a special tourist event in the waterfront on a boat for Cape Canopy Tourist company
- Bands played at 2 weddings- one at Southill, Grabouw & De Meye, Stellenbosch
- RAN hosted the Suidooster talentsoek kompetisie. Betsie Ryke was part of the panel of judges. More than 60 solo artists & other acts from De Rust & Groenberg ouditioned. 2 soloist (1 from De Rust & 1 from Groenberg) and the De rust Futura Prestige Marimba band made it through to the next round in March 2023 in Artscape
- Wine to Whales 6 of our less experienced marimba bands from various farm schools had the opportunity to play at the waterpoint at the country club
- We took part in various categories at the Overberg Eisteddfod and the Helderberg Eisteddfod (marimba, fine art & Choirs)
- We regularly play and sing at community functions, prize givings, funerals
- Hessequa Harmonie, Heidelberg. The prestige marimba band played at the main event at the Dassedrift theatre and took part in the Gala concert for mass choirs accompanied by the youth symphony orchestra of Cape Town



## Stories and Reflections

It is the experience of the principal and teachers at De Rust Futura Academy that the learners are mentally activated by the activities that RAN and other service providers present at the school. It sets the tone for the day- learners are notably more focussed and energised.

Mr Du Toit, acting headmaster at Kathleen Murray Primary, says that he is keen on the Monday morning marimba classes, because it is often a much-needed stress relief activity for the learners after traumatic weekends under challenging circumstance in their home and community environments. Alcohol abuse, gang activities and violent acts takes place in proximity of their homes. Music and art activities provides the necessary mental and stress relief to stabilize the learners for the week.

Through our RAN activities we create a save space where troubled pupils often feel at ease enough to share or reveal their personal hardships and challenges to us.

#### **Music appreciation project (MAP)**



#### Background

The Music appreciation project was created due to and in accordance with the COVID lockdown and safety regulations. We launched the pilot project in August 2020. This project was well received by the various schools. Due to the wonderful response & success of this project we have continued and expanded this project into various schools, aftercare facilities and community hubs during 2021.

The popularity of the project speaks for itself and the demand for this intervention keeps increasing. Therefor we continued in 2022 and will want to continue and expand, but all in line with funding granted.

It has been well received and is in great demand.

The project was aimed at the Foundation Phase (Gr1-3) and Grade R.

Due to the overwhelming demand by the schools, we have since expanded into Intermediate Phase adding Gr 4-6.

#### **Outcomes:**

- Brings much needed distraction from the hectic academic program for both teachers and pupils.
- On a psychological level it brings relief from stress, anxiety, fear, and hopelessness that was clearly visible amongst the pupils and beneficiaries from the various communities and farms.
- It brings back a sense of normality and even fun
- most sports-and extramural activities have been cancelled and the creative arts activities are the only additional activities apart from the curriculum & academic workload
- Music, dance & movement, and rhythmics exposure broadens and stimulate the beneficiaries holistically in many waysmentally, emotionally, psychologically, and physically

#### **Footprint**

Our contact point for most of our activities are at schools. These entities as schools, churches and aftercare venues provide structured facilities & venues and serves as community hubs.

Currently we are running this program at the following schools:

Pineview -, Kathleen Murray -, St Michaels -, Maxonia-, Dennegeur Primary,

Due to external challenges and the school's schedules at Grabouw High and De Rust Futura Academy we had to pause the MAP for now.

The Grabouw MAP program has been replaced by a recorder program for Gr 2 as requested by the school.

#### Jeug Ontwikkelings Projek- (JOP)

#### Background

This program was initiated due to the postponement of the re-opening date of schools from 25 Jan 2021- 15 Feb 2021. When we could not start in the schools' we had to look at alternatives to create work opportunities for our facilitators.

At the time the National Department of Education had the assistants- program running as a way of job creation for the youth at schools across the country. We saw this as a great opportunity to raise up assistants for our music appreciation program. We engaged and partnered with the schools and negotiated a great working arrangement.

What makes it even more ideal, is that we identified assistants at the local schools that have been part of our RAN projects whilst they were still at school. All of them have been through our projects either through singing in a choir or playing in a marimba band for a period of 5-7 years.

#### First JOP group Feb 2021- March 2022

We engaged with the Conservatorium of Stellenbosch and Danell Herbst, a lecturer at the US music department has been doing workshops – training and developing our JOP assistants to roll out the RAN music appreciation project. We have had 6 workshops since February at The Thembalitsha HUB – where we have demonstration lessons with the Grade R class that resides on the premises.

In addition to the training, this group is now also an official Marimba band that practises weekly, reinforcing their musical- and teaching skills. The weekly marimba band practise provides and enhances their skills and repertoire so

that they can now assist with the marimba training at the schools that have marimba sets.

They very successfully performed at the Hessequa Harmonie Festival, Heidelberg in September 2021. The whole experience was an accelerated learning curve in various life skills (audience etiquette, social interaction with various groups, building up their confidence, financial responsibilities, building relationships, handling group dynamics & conflict). The group was exposed to the broader aspects of various art forms, and they attended music concerts and various productions in different genres.

At the picnic festival where they had their solo performance they were well received and did so well under pressure. The group was part of the grand finale performing together with well-known singers and artists like bass guitarist Schalk Joubert, singer & TV presenter Jak de Priester, Niel Rademan

organiser& singer and opera singer Amanda Osorio.

During November/December 2021 to March 2022 we continued with the workshops and training.

Focussing on Life skills, personal development, Music, art, and occupational Therapy skills to address and support learning and physical disabilities that we discern when working with the beneficiaries.

We have added the Specialised Arts students to the JOP project.

Since January 2022 some changes happened in this program. Some of our assistants have accepted permanent jobs and other have resumed their studies.

We have however incorporated 3 of our matriculants of 2021 into the program and all the beneficiaries that left to study

or work are still part of the marimba band and we have entered them into the virtual International Marimba and Steelpan festival that takes place in October 2022.



# Since January 2022 the JOP Marimba group has performed at several events:

Southhill, Grabouw - wedding 7 April

Tourist event in the waterfront for Cape Canopy tours 11 April It is wonderful to see the

impact of the exposure that the beneficiaries experience. It gives them a bigger vision and dream bigger dreams about the world beyond Grabouw.

#### **Instrumental Tuition**

We have been running a Recorder & Music Theory project for the past 3 years. Because of NLC funding we could enter 5 of the 26 beneficiaries for the Trinity College of London's official exams. This would not have been possible without the financial support as the beneficiaries would not have been able to pay the entry fee of R585 per student. This is a first for all of them and opens a whole new world for the beneficiaries and their families.

We now have 8 recorder exams pupils preparing for the music exams in April 2023

We invited parents and family to and evening where the students could perform their exam pieces- the amazement on the faces of the audience –priceless!



#### **Exam successes November 2021**

**Preparation for Trinity recorder exam** During October/November we continued preparing our 5 beneficiaries for their Initial Trinity recorder exam. 5 Pupils from Grabouw High had to be video recorded and we sent our recordings to Trinity College for adjudication. We are very proud to say that the following learners, Chelsea, Keziah, Xaria, Lisa and Andrea passed with distinction. Ranging from 92%-94%.

#### 2022 Preparing for Trinity college initial & Unisa exams

**In March 2022** we started **2 new recorder groups** with 13 Grade 2 recorder pupils and 8 Grade 4-6 learners. They are already showing promise and we are looking forward to the journey ahead.

Guitar lessons and Drums have commenced from February 2022. Music tuition takes place on Thursday Afternoons from 14:00-16:30. A total of 29 beneficiaries receive lessons on Thursday with 3 facilitators and 2 trainee-assistants.

## Outcomes & Benefits

As time progressed, we could see how the beneficiaries holistically improved during the implementation of the projects. The 2-year Covid lockdown have visibly slowed down and disrupted the development of our children.

We have seen the following impact, improvement, and outcomes that our interventions and projects are having, making a direct contribution to the holistic development of our leaners:

Music affected the social cohesion in the classroom and teachers commented that beneficiaries displayed:

- a greater self-reliance and social adjustment
- that students were less aggressive
- that there was a better connection between the learners
- Reading & math skills improved

#### The RAN team noted that:

- The musicians and artists memory improved
- Learning the skill of understanding non-verbal communication
- · Attention to detail is being developed
- Coordination and dexterity

We would like to thank all our funders and donors for the ongoing financial support we received. We cannot put into words how much we value and appreciate the funding that we receive. It has made our journey rewarding, but more importantly the journey of the most vulnerable in our rural community of Grabouw -the children and youth at risk were enriched on so many levels through the grant received.

It has enabled us to establish a solid foundation and sustainability for our projects and NGO.

Especially, at a time as this, we bring light and hope through the creative arts to the marginalised communities in the rural areas that need it the most.
